Now we will have another opportunity to strengthen bonds of affection and understanding among Fellows of the I.C.D. by attending the presentation of a charter to a new unit of the College, Section Four of South America. The South American Section was voted autonomy by the executive council of the I.C.D. last Oct. 19 in Dallas, Tex., and will receive its charter Jan. 16, 1981, in Sao Paulo, Brazil.

Dr. Dioracy Vieira of San Paulo, President of the new Section, has invited all I.C.D. Fellows to participate in the charter ceremonies which will include a formal installation of officers and new Fellows, followed by a reception and banquet. Installation rites also will be held in Buenos Aires, Argentina; Santiago, Chile, and Lima, Peru. Special travel arrangements are being made for Fellows from other parts of the world who wish to attend these festivities, the details of which will be found elsewhere in this publication.

We extend congratulations to the new officers of the South American Section who are: Dr. Vieira of Brazil, president: Dr. Nicholas Parula of Argentina, president elect; Dr. Ruben Quintana of Chile, vice president; Dr. Julio Begazo of Peru, registrar-treasurer, and Dr. Carlos Leon-Diaz of Venezuela, editor.

Relations between the superpowers have become more abrasive than they have been in years. Flash points, such as Iran and Afghanistan, seem to erupt almost overnight.

The resolution of these problems is in the hands of national leaders and all the world prays that they will succeed. These grave matters lie far beyond the province of any single profession such as our own.

And yet, in this time of strife and tension, it is somehow reassuring to know that our International College of Dentists is continuing with its mission of building bridges of friendship and information exchange between our colleagues in all parts of the world. That remains the primary role of the I.C.D., as it has been since our founding in 1927.

At the close of the last decade, we noted with pride the sisterhood agreement established between the University of Florida College of Dentistry and the Tokyo Dental College for the mutual development of educational and research programs. The I.C.D. was much involved in the planning for this agreement. Our Visiting Scholars Program brought a Fellow of the College from Japan to the United States for a well-received tour. A large group of I.C.D. members and other colleagues took part in dental seminars in Japan, Taiwan, Manila, and Hong Kong, and some of them also visited mainland China, Bali, Singapore, and Bangkok.

Now, as a new decade has begun, we can look to the further extension and strengthening of bridges of understanding between dentists in many nations. A new Outreach effort has been initiated by our Nebraska Chapter and will involve sending professional books to the dental college at the University of The Philippines. Contributions to this effort will be made by the C.V. Mosby Co. and by the dental schools of Northwestern, Washington (St. Louis), and Indiana University. The books will be transported by the U.S. Navy. Emerging countries have a great need for this type of help and I hope our efforts can be expanded.


The long-awaited formation of an autonomous South America section of the College will be realized in January, 1981, when the charter will be presented at a convocation in Brazil. Chapters will come to fruition in Rio de Janeiro, Sao Paulo, Buenos Aires, Santiago, and Lima, as a wonderful culmination of some 15 years of plans, preparations, and dreams

I had the good fortune of meeting many of our colleagues in Puerto Rico, where I discussed the impact of economic, political, and social changes on the practice of dentistry at the University of Puerto Rico.

Ruthe and I are enjoying the personal role we are able to play in establishing friendships with I.C.D. Fellows and their families throughout the world. As I write this, we are getting ready for an extensive visit to the Far East that will take us to Korea, Formosa, Hong Kong, The Philippines, and Kyoto and Tokyo, Japan, with a final stop in Hawaii. I will be addressing many dental groups, attending scientific sessions, and visiting dental schools, all with the ultimate aim of stimulating the exchange of scientific knowledge and the solidification of international fellowship through dentistry.

We look forward with much anticipation to this journey and we hope to have similar opportunities in other parts of the world during the remainder of our term.

In these perilous days and hours, the I.C.D. continues quietly to extend the hand of friendship across the world's many dividing lines. May it always be so.

The President-Elect of the College, Joseph W. Tamari, comes from Beirut, Lebanon.

Joe Tamari was born on December 22, 1923, to a family of merchants. His father dealt in commodities and was a citrus grower and exporter. From his early childhood Joe and his three brothers would go to their father's office and "play business" in a corner of the premises.

When it came to choosing a profession Joe was inclined towards one of the health sciences. After matriculating in 1939 at the age of 16, he entered the Dental School at the French Faculty of Beirut, as the American University of Beirut Dental School had just closed its doors because of financial trouble.

His four years of dental education were a success, with Joe at the top of his class throughout. He graduated in 1943 when the Second World War was still raging and dental equipment was in short supply. The first years following graduation were difficult ones - what with the war and the possibility of traveling non-existent. It was not until the end of 1949, when Joe joined the Arabian American Oil Company in Dhahran, Saudi Arabia, that his meaningful dental career actually started. Those were wonderful pioneering days for Joe. During the seven years he spent with Aramco, he not only learned more about dentistry from his American colleagues, but also learned at first hand how a giant business operates. It was in those days that he was exposed to the principles of wages and salaries, employee relations, government relations, industrial compensation and labor laws, etc . . .

The demands of his job also necessitated that he be more conversant in hospital dentistry, oral surgery and related subjects. In order to gain this expertise, he took

graduate courses in England and felt privileged to train under, and associate with, the leaders in these specialties. Periodically throughout his professional career he would seek from them answers to his problems and then return to the field to translate them into action.

During his years with Aramco he was constantly motivated to pursue advanced dental education. In early 1957 he resigned from Aramco, took courses at the Royal College of Surgeons in England and then passed an entrance examination (covering the basic and clinical sciences) for Northwestern University Dental School. He again enrolled as an undergraduate working towards another D.D.S. Joe felt this was better than specializing, as it afforded him the opportunity of becoming exceptionally well grounded in the various disciplines of dentistry rather than in one or two.


In December 1958 he graduated from Northwestern and after spending another six months on an educational tour of England and the Continent, he returned to Beirut and established a successful private practice.

He was invited to join the I.C.D. in 1961 and lost no time in building around it an organization which, with the cooperation of the dental graduates of the American University of Beirut, helped launch in 1963 the first Middle East Dental Assembly. It turned out to be a resounding success and subsequently became an established program.

Until that time, postgraduate education had been more or less dormant and this activity, along with others, contributed a great deal towards creating a new era. It was during this period that Joe played an active role by serving as the Vice President of the Lebanese Dental Association and President of its Scientific Committee.

In 1964 Joe married the girl behind the scene, who had been doing the paper work and contributing to the success of dental meetings. It was a happy team from the start and proved to be even more so in the middle of later adversities. Nadia became Joe's constant companion everywhere.

In 1975 the civil war in Lebanon broke out. Joe and Nadia and their two sons came to the states, where Joe was invited to join the faculty at Northwestern University Dental School. His time was divided between the Department of Oral Diagnosis and the Multiphasic Clinic. He taught a

course in occlusion and also one in treatment planning.

He returned to Beirut in the fall of 1978 to resume his private practice, but maintained his assocation with Northwestern as visiting lecturer. He is proud of his association with Northwestern and regards it as a meaningful and rewarding one.

In addition to his untiring pursuit of clinical excellence, Joe has been engaged in dental research for the last fifteen years and has published papers on muscle function, mechanics of pain inhibition and school dental health in Lebanese primary schools. He still spends one day per week with his cats at the American University of Beirut, where, among other functions, he holds a position in the Department of Human Morphology.


In spite of the many demands on his time, Joe often finds himself involved in a heavy lecturing schedule, which has taken him several times to various Middle Eastern countries.

In civic life Joe is also very active and keeps busy in a number of local benevolent organizations. He enjoys membership in the American College of Dentists, The Pierre Fauchard Academy, the Academy of General Dentistry, the G.V. Black Society and the John Evans Club.

Joe fondly recalls his days as a star soccer player and a swimmer. He also enjoyed tennis, but had to give it up in later years following an injury to his palm. He now enjoys a challenging game of bridge and tries hard to keep in good physical condition by walking one hour per day and doing gym exercises three times per week.

L.D. Pankey's teachings have had a great impact on Joe's professional life. He is a strong believer in Pankey's philosophy and is a frequent visitor of the Pankey Institute in Miami. He tries to pattern his daily practice after those teachings, but he admits occasional failures in this pursuit. This is, perhaps, part of being human.


In spite of the adversities and difficult times Joe has encountered in life, he is always thankful for the many blessings which the Lord has been good to bestow on him and his family.

RIDLEN recommends giving other Sections more space; HAWKINS requested more information from other Sections to utilize this space. AMATURO moved and MIMMACK seconded, that the Editor's report be received with thanks.

Section reports were given by the Councilmen representatives of the Sections present.

KENWARD spoke on size of South America and its potential. RIDLEN moved and AMATURO seconded that vote be taken to approve South America as Autonomous Section. Carried. KENWARD reported on mechanics of meetings with South America representatives for initial organizational plans. Slate of officers approved by all concerned.

Section that a Section be allowed its full number of votes as indicated in Article IX, Section 2 of the Constitution whether all the Councilmen from the Section are present or not, this to be accomplished through the use of proxy votes. Each sec-

tion shall arrange how it wishes to implement the use of proxy votes.

The motion was seconded by LANKHOF. The motion carried and the Constitution was duly amended. MIMMACK moved and LANKHOF seconded that special meeting be adjourned, motion passed, and President DE VERE GREEN reconvened the Annual Meeting.

Visiting Scholars should be confined to a specific area and Sections should advise the central office if they want someone or have someone to serve as visiting scholar. **DON ALLEN** spoke on "sisterhood" relationship of Tokyo Dental College and University of Florida.





From the days when gold foil manipulation was taught by Charles E. Woodbury, a man who commanded the respect of student and graduate alike, one of his astute remarks sticks indelibly in my memory. "Do every restoration better than the last one, for improvement has no stopping place."

This thinking can apply to practically every daily challenge we encounter. I relate this to my 18 years of International College affiliation where I have witnessed the work of two Registrars who constantly had improvement in mind.

At our Executive Committee meeting in Chicago, we discussed projects that indicate ongoing concerted action. Among them is "Operation Outreach," a plan conceived by Fellow Ray Grove of Nebraska to send dental books and periodicals to the Philippine Section of the I.C.D. for distribution to dental schools there. Regents and deputy regents have contacted local libraries for donations of surplus items which are being shipped to the Philippines aboard U.S. Navy vessels from San Diego. Every member of the U.S.A. Section will have an opportunity to contribute to this effort.

Nine years ago the U.S.A. Section began presenting awards to editors of outstanding dental publications for excellence in journalism. This year 131 entries vied for the awards presented at the annual ADA sponsored journalism conference in April, and additional categories were established in order to recognize the widely divergent types of publications.

A charter will be presented to a new autonomous South America Section next January in conjunction with an I.C.D. tour and exchange of knowledge through clinics in five South American cities.

Our finance committee has wisely invested our dues monies in certificates of deposit to obtain maximum interest on fully-insured funds. Operating costs affect the College as they do other enterprises and many expenses have increased. Knowing that today our finances are in a healthy state is indeed heartwarming.

The class to be inducted in New Orleans Oct. 11 is complete, and the related activities have been pretty well wrapped, ribbon and all, at this early date.



President Elect of The U.S.A. Section, George Jackson (Jack) Collings was born on July 27, 1920 and raised in Montana.

His father was a mining engineer, and the family moved from one mining town to another. Jack's father died when he was eight, and he and his mother and two sisters went to live with his mother's two bachelor brothers and father. They lived on a wheat ranch near Sun River, Montana. The nearest school was five miles away and in the snowy Montana winter it was a chore to attend. Jack's grandfather had a wonderful library full of old classics and it was there that Jack developed his love of fine literature. The wheat ranch had lots of rattlesnakes to snare, rabbit, birds and arrowhead hunting. Trapping in the winter was also part of the activities. Seeing the fine balance of nature helped develop the importance of conservation. The heritage of the "OLD WEST" and history of the Indian, took on a new meaning, which led to his collection of artifacts and, eventually, an extensive library of the West.

During his senior year in high school, he met Ruth Phillips who was to become his wife. After graduation from high school, he attended Montana State University in Bozeman, Montana for three years where Ruth graduated from nurses' training. Jack and Ruth were married in 1943 at Ruth's parents cattle ranch in Montana.

Their first home was in Seattle, Washington, where Jack completed his undergraduate education. In 1945, they moved to Portland, Oregon and Jack attended the University of Oregon Dental School graduating in 1949. Jack was active in the Psi Omega Dental Fraternity and was elected President of Chi Chapter in 1948.

Jack and Ruth were blessed with one child, a daughter, Elizabeth (Beth) born in 1950. As she grew up, the love of outdoors promoted many family camping trips and travel to historic sites. Beth graduated in June, 1980, in Dentistry, at the University of Oregon Health Science Center. Quoting Beth: "Dad's own personal enthusiasm for his profession and quest for knowledge, has been great encouragement and inspiration to me, throughout the years." Jack feels great pride in the fact she has chosen his profession.

Though they only had one child, there are many young people who call the Collings' home a "haven." They are called #1 son, #2 son, etc. and that applies to the female gender, as well. Over the years, there are about 12 that are still part of their lives. Both parents and Beth feel it has made caring, sharing, and living a richer and more meaningful relationship with everyone. They call them "Their Extended Family."

Upon graduation, Jack received the Oral Surgery Scholastic Award. After two years of post-graduate work, he started practicing Oral Surgery in Portland. He continued his activities in his fraternity and served as assistant, Deputy Counselor for 10 years and President of the Alumni Chapter of Psi Omega. This work was interrupted by the Korean War, in which he was Chief of Oral Surgery at Hamilton Air Force Base in California and Hickam Air Force Base in Hawaii, during years 1953 — 1955. When he returned to civilian life, he was elected as Province I Councelor of Psi Omega from 1966 -1972, and was National President in 1969 -1970. This was followed by Secretary-Treasurer, Vice President, and President of National Dental Interfraternity Council. He is still active in the Fraternity and was proud to pin his own daughter when she was initiated into Psi Omega.

In 1960, Jack was inducted into I.C.D. and has served as Councelor and Deputy Regent for Oregon, and in 1972 was appointed Regent of the 11th District. He held this position for six years . . . receiving the "Regent of the Year" award in 1978. Jack feels very honored to be a Fellow in the I.C.D. It has been exciting and rewarding and his aims and ideals have broadened through exchange of Fellowship nationally and internationally.

Jack served as Secretary and Treasurer of the University of Oregon Dental School Alumni Association from 1969 - 1971 and President from 1971 — 1973. During his two years, as president, he worked in forming the "Dean's Club" . . . whereby Alumni could contribute money to construct a postgraduate facility. Jack and Dean Terkla lectured on this subject for two years to every state dental meeting in the west . . . including Hawaii and Alaska. The postgraduate department has become a reality and Jack was elected "Alumnus of the Year" in 1974. He has given generously of his time and money because it is an important part of his life. He is a member of Omicron Kappa Upsilon. He has been active in his local dental society and served as state delegate and clinician for many years and as committee chairman in many capacities.

In 1971, after Jack attended many courses on Implantology, he decided to incorporate this phase of dentistry into his practice. It has continued to grow as his interest and knowledge expands. He has published several articles on Implants. He was one of the Founders of Oregon Research Implant Seminars and served as President for two years. He is a member of the American Academy of Implant Dentistry (A.A.I.D.) and at present, serves on the Administration & Credentials Committee, **Education and Public Relation Committee** and the Editorial board. He has given many courses on Implantology. "Implantology, to me, is a challenge and a new horizon for Dentistry."

He has his Fellowship in the American College of Dentists, American Society of Anesthesiology and is a member of Oregon & American Society of Oral and Maxofacial Surgery.

While housing and working with (and for) young people, his dedication for physical fitness led to the construction of a first-class gym in his basement for himself and the boys. His involvement with the youth of his church and a police friend, started him in a strange life in undercover narcotics with Multnomah County Police of Portland. He now confines his narcotic life lecturing to professional and civic organizations throughout the western states, using



underworld characters and a narcotic agent . . . to put his point across. This lecture has been presented at the Oregon Dental School each year.

Jack goes to the office at 6:30 a.m. in order to leave early in the afternoon to spend time in the gym and running. The 10,000 meter races are great, with his daughter, Beth, and extended family members participating at different times.

Jack's hobbies are dentistry, continuing education courses of all types, Collecting Western Art and history in book and picture form, hunting, and fishing. The salmon fishing trips are a "family" affair and arrangements are made a year in advance.

Jack thinks he has it made, with friends, church, family and work that you enjoy ... what more could you ask for? Their doorlatch is open to everyone!

President LOFLIN reported on the advances of the Section during the past year and expressed his appreciation for the help received from the staff members.

President-Elect RASMUSSEN gave his report and expressed his desire to aid the direction of the Section and College in the

Registrar KENWARD stated that the total membership of the College after the 1979 convocation stands at 4,995, with the U.S.A. membership at 3,410, including 450 Life members.

The Registrar briefly summarized his July 1979 visit to South America which was made for the purpose of setting up an autonomous South American Section. The Charter presentation is set for January of 1981. See South American Section News for more details. Registrar KENWARD announced that the I.C.D. Headquarters in New Orleans will be at the Hilton Hotel.

Treasurer John T. REIFKE reported that the U.S.A. Section was financially sound and his report was accepted with a vote of thanks. Finance Committee Chairman, RI-CHARD C. RICE, presented the 1980 Budget and Regent HOPKINS moved the acceptance of the 1980 Budget, seconded by Regent YEE and it passed with complements to the Chairman and the committee.

Editor, w.E. HAWKINS,, reported that the Section's Annual Journalism Awards Banquet would be held on April 14, 1980, at Lake Buena Vista, Florida.

The Regents reported on the activities in their respective districts with all districts active and holding meetings.

The Committee on the Visiting Scholars Program reported that it was reviewing MO-TOHITO KATOH lecture tour and will recommend methods to improve the next lecture tour by a visiting clinician.

Projects Chairman, HERB GREWE reported that the committee was reviewing a request from RAY GROVE for books to be sent to dental schools in countries outside the U.S.A.

The Convocation and Banquet Committee reported that the ceremonies will be held at the New Orleans Hilton on Saturday, October 11, 1980.

The following amendments to the Constitution and Bylaws were recommended and action taken as noted:

- a. Amend list of officers to include Editor. Approved.
- b. Amend Article IV, Sect. 4 to drop number of years required for Life Membership and add fee for publications for Life members to be determined annually to Life Membership qualifications. Fee is for publications only and does not affect Life Membership status.
- c. Add Editor to Article VI, Sections 1,
 4 and 5 as set forth in Proposed Changes.
- d. Article VII to be revised after further consideration as to Council Representation. EBERHARDT to pursue recommendation that Board of Regents nominate 2 Councilmen who shall be empowered to vote for 12 if Council will allow proxy vote. Article be rewritten based on decision of Executive Council. Carried. CYRIL DE VERE GREEN pointed out that if 12 Councilmen were elected in addition to Officers, there could be as many as 16 U.S.A. members of Council, and it was agreed that the 12 should include officers on motion by braly, seconded by rasmussen.

- e. BRALY moved, R. RICE seconded, to approve Article VIII as amended.
- f. Articles XI, XII, XIII were approved with change to include Editor as elected officer.
- g. PETERS moved, YEE seconded, change in fiscal year to January 1-December 31. Carried.



U.S.C. Honors Fellow Earl Pound

The Foundation for Denture Research, a non-profit organization, honored its founder, Fellow EARL POUND, on the occasion of his induction into the University of Southern California School of Dentistry's Hall of Fame. The December 7th dinner followed the University's induction on December 6, 1979, recognizing POUND's more than 50 years of contribution to his profession. The Hall of Fame is the highest honor the University bestows on an alumnus.

More than 50 of Fellow **POUND's** family, friends and colleagues joined Fellow **GEORGE MURRELL**, President of the Foundation for Denture Research, in an evening of tribute at the California Club in Los Angeles, California.

EARL POUND, formerly from Vancouver, British Columbia, graduated from the University of Southern California in 1923 and practiced in Hollywood until he joined the U.S. Naval Dental Corps in 1942. In 1943, he became head of the prosthodontic department at Oak Knoll Naval Hospital and was assigned to the Department of Plastic Surgery to aid in the rehabilitation of war wounds of the face. For his outstanding

contributions, he received the Navy Citation commendation medal in 1945 from Secretary of the Navy, JAMES FORESTALL.

He returned to Los Angeles and private practice in 1946, incorporating many innovative changes in his techniques and management of denture patients. In 1971, he moved to Westlake Village, California, where he now lives and practices part time.

POUND made the first presentation of his naval inspired research in 1949. This related to developing a more natural appearance, shading, and contouring of dentures.

In 1952 he became a Diplomate of the American Board of Prosthodontics and in that same year was invited by EVITA and JUAN PERON as a dental school advisor and speaker in Argentina. Since then he has traveled around the world teaching and presenting his innovative concepts of denture construction. In 1962 he began forming denture study groups to do research and further the cause of complete denture prosthodontics. In 1971 these groups were formed into the Foundation for Denture Research and under his guidance their findings are now being promoted throughout the United States, Canada, Japan, Italy and Australia. He has completed over 30 publications, two teaching manuals on complete dentures and has made video

teaching tapes through Case Western Reserve University of Cleveland, Ohio and the University of Alabama.

Fellow Clarence Honig Honored By California Dental Association.

Clarence "Spike" Honig, DDS, of Bel Air, was honored by the California Dental Association (CDA) for 35 years of service to the dental profession. CDA dedicated its 1980 Spring Scientific Session, held May 2-5 in Anaheim, to HONIG. Official ceremonies were held Saturday, May 3, at a luncheon at the Anaheim Convention Center.

Fellow **HONIG**, an orthodontist who has practiced in Beverly Hills since 1946, served as Speaker of the House of Delegates of CDA for seven years and was named Speaker Emeritus in 1978. 
Chain of Office.


It is the sincere desire of the College that professional goodwill and closer international relationship of I.C.D. members in all countries will be brought about through this exchange of knowledge and fellowship.



WALTER REIF

Introducing WALTER REIF President of the European Section

President REIF qualified in dentistry at the University of Bonn, Bonn, Germany, in 1928. He moved to London, England, in 1935 where he has practiced general dentistry for the past forty five years.

He became a founding member of the Anglo-Continental Dental Society and served as it's President for nine years.

Following World War II, he helped further international dentistry in England by stressing continuing education in bridgework and endodontics.

Fellow REIF was elected to Fellowship in the International College of Dentists in 1960 and served as Regent for Great Britain, Ireland, Malta, and Cypress from 1965 to 1975. He was a founding member of the British Endodontic Society and served as its President in 1974.

WALTER REIF actively participated in the London (Metropolitan) Branch of the British Dental Association, serving as President of the Branch and Chairman of the Council.

At the 1979 Paris meeting of the European Section, Fellow REIF ended his address with the following comments that express his feeling concerning the College.

"I consider myself lucky in having within my span of life, the opportunity of doing the things which fulfill one's life and therefore gaining true happiness, and this true happiness I have found in the fellowship of this College. It is now twenty times that I have listened to and watched the Induction Ceremony when many most meritorious colleagues from all over Europe pledged themselves to play their part in the College. To be a member of a professional organization is useful and important, to be asked to join the fellowship of this College is fundamentally different and so are the obligations. I find that the groundswell of this fellowship cannot be simply explained intellectually. There is, for me and perhaps for a number of you, an emotional factor present which only one's heart can explain. Wherever you go in this world and wherever you meet a fellow, you meet a friend."

STON, president of the University; Dr. WILLIAM B. DEAL, vice-president for Health Affairs, and Fellow DON L. ALLEN, dean of the College of Dentistry. Also present at the formal signing was Fellow FRANKLIN M. KENWARD, Secretary-general of the International College of Dentists, who had assisted with the development of the agreement.

The sisterhood agreement, which has been under development since 1977, establishes a program by which faculty members of each college may visit the sister institution to continue their education in the various disciplines of dentistry and in dental education. During these periods, the visiting faculty may assist in the education of dental students at the host school.

In Memoriam

We regret to inform you that MASAO MURASE, Executive Councilman of the College and Past President of the Japan Section died on November 25, 1979.

Faculty and technical staff may make short-term visits to share in the development of educational methods. The colleges will also collaborate on research projects. A liaison committee of faculty from both institutions will be appointed to develop projects of mutual interest.

Dental students will also benefit from the sisterhood agreement through a program which allows students to formally or informally enroll in the sister school. The agreement also encourages the enrollment in advanced education or continuing education programs at the sister college by graduates of each institution.

The Tokyo Dental College, the oldest of the 28 dental colleges in Japan, will celebrate its 90th anniversary in 1980. The college's graduates number over ten thousand.






