



In 2008, the Maryland Chapter lost two members who, over many years, were tireless contributors to organized dentistry, a reflection of the criteria for selection into Fellowship in the International College of Dentists. It seems appropriate to include personal memories of these two Fellows, and as Editor, I greatly appreciate the emotional task that each family member took to express the following recollection of their Dad:

Sheldon Silverman – Dentist, Humanitarian, Mentor

I was blessed with the great privilege of having Sheldon Silverman as my father. As I grew up seeing him go off to work each day and return home so tired each night, I could never really conceive of what it was that he spent all day doing. Sure, as a kid growing up in the 60's, I had teeth he had to restore, but that did not give me a real sense of what he spent his full time doing. I could not conceive of the challenges of running and producing in a full-time dental practice until I started actually working with him in 1985. His intense energy, productivity and drive, kept the practice humming along as a well-oiled machine. This was only one facet of this great man. My mother, sister and family dearly miss this man of great presence. His contributions far exceed what he gave to his patients and myself.

His immense contributions to organized dentistry made him a giant in the field. As I worked with him to put his Curriculum Vitae into electronic format I had to struggle for hours to shrink fonts and squeeze all of his activities into two crammed-full pages. When I was young he served his dental fraternity, Alpha Omega in many ways. The University of Maryland Dental School Alumni Association was his passion and seeing the divided alumni association reunited gave him great pride. Baltimore City Dental Society was another passion of his; through this organization he provided great service to the MSDA. Truly, organized dentistry has suffered a great loss with the passing of Sheldon Silverman.

My father's nomination to the State Board of Dental Examiners was a great honor to him and it was one that he worked tirelessly to fulfill. His served the state in many capacities. His extensive contributions won him a governor's citation that I proudly display. Yes, despite his high level of service to the citizens of the State of Maryland, he never abandoned his compassion for the hardworking; formerly know as wet-fingered, dentist in all of his dental board activities. He brought a

sense of sanity, reason and true caring to the board that has not been seen with any consistency. Yes, this was a man whose contributions will live as a permanent legacy of his greatness.

As the dentist son of this man I have studied his ways in private practice extensively. I asked him for advice so many times that I got to the point where I could recite his answers even before I asked him the question. Each and every piece of wisdom he shared with me was a gem, and I use each of them extensively even today. His support made everything more fun and rewarding and I will miss him greatly. To each of you who knew him, I thank you for the fulfillment you brought to his life and I strive to be qualified to represent his name. I want to personally thank the dental profession for all that you gave to Sheldon Silverman. It was his pleasure to give to you!

When asked if I would like to share some thoughts and words about my father, Dr. D. Michael Brown, I immediately said yes. Getting these words on paper, however, was more difficult than I had anticipated! It's not that I didn't know what to say; there's so much to tell. It's just that I couldn't get through my thoughts without tears welling up in my eyes as I reflected upon the most incredible man I will ever have the chance to know.

So many of you knew Mike Brown the professional; the private practitioner, the Dental School faculty member, the leader in Organized Dentistry. The kind words that so many of you sent our way were most comforting and right on the mark. Here are just a few; he was a true gentleman/ a dear friend and colleague/ the type of person many of us would like to emulate/ he led by example/ he was a mentor/ he was a quiet leader/ he stood for what he believed was in the best interest of others/ he talked to me before I was "anyone"/ he respected everyone around him/ he will be truly missed. I could go on and on!

I'd like you to know a bit about the Mike Brown that I knew. He had just turned 16 when he started college, the Great Books Program at St. John's College in Annapolis. He was bright, intuitive, and welcomed the demanding curriculum of such a unique educational program. He maintained a private dental practice for many years, and eventually decided to become a full time faculty member at the Dental School. He was very active in Organized Dentistry, and in his community. I remember his going to many meetings, but some of my most vivid memories are of my two sister and I sitting on the floor of the bedroom, watching in awe as my parents would get ready for Southern Maryland and MSDA events. He was so handsome in his tuxedo, my mom so beautiful in her gown. Wow, I would think, this dentistry thing is pretty cool! He taught me to do so many things- from diving through the waves at the beach; to cutting the lawn and planting a garden; from skiing down big mountains to putting up drywall; from catching fish to doing plumbing; from riding a bike to rebuilding the water system at the house. And id we did something wrong (and what kids don't) he did not yell, or spank, or take away privileges. He disciplined us through dialogue, asking us to think about what we did, and what we might do differently the next time. For whatever reason, I usually thought my explanation of "I didn't do it on purpose" was sufficient. It was indeed sufficient enough for me to have some extra time to think about it!

He did not compare me to others, nor did he allow me to compare myself to others either. With each of his daughters, he asked that we be the best that we could possibly be. He encouraged us to challenge ourselves, to seek the road less traveled, to take whatever opportunities we had and to make the very best of them. He taught us to be honest and respectful, that nothing worth having is just handed to you but rather earned through hard work and effort, and that saving up for that special thing, or event, makes it that much more gratifying.

He was someone's husband, father, grandfather, brother, colleague, neighbor, friend. I had the honor and privilege of knowing, loving, and admiring Mike Brown as a father, a teacher, a mentor, a confidant, and a friend. I know that you will not think of him as many times as day as I do, but I do hope that when you think of D. Michael Brown you will do so with a smile on your face. Miss you, Dad!
