Excerpted portions of Constitution and Bylaws tell the essence of our College

ARTICLE I NAME AND OFFICE

Section 1. The name of the College is "International College of Dentists", hereinafter referred to as "the College"

Section 2. The office of the College shall be located at and its affairs conducted from the office maintained for such purposes. This office shall be established by the International Council and shall be managed by the Secretary General.

ARTICLE II OBJECTIVES

The objectives for which the College is established are:

- **a.** To advance the science and art of dentistry for the health and welfare of the public internationally.
- **b.** To encourage postgraduate study and research in the field of dental science and cognate subjects.
- c. To endeavor to bring together outstanding members of the dental profession of the world for the purpose of fostering the growth and diffusion of dental knowledge and to encourage an exchange of good will among members of the profession.
- **d.** To cultivate and foster cordial relations among those engaged in the profession of dentistry and other health professions.
- e. To take whatever action is possible to cooperate with dentists and various organizations for the prevention and control of oral disorders.
- f. To maintain and elevate the dignity of the profession by the maintenance of the highest standard of ethical and professional conduct by its members who are enjoyed to recognize their responsi-

bility to participate in the affairs of society as citizens of the community and to willingly accept responsibility for committee service in the field of peer review, grievances, legislation and the like when requested and as appropriate.

h. To recognize conspicuous and meritorious service to the profession and stimulate continuing efforts directed to the attainment of the objectives of the College by providing a method of granting Fellowship in the College.



ARTICLE IV MEMBERSHIP

There shall be at least four (4) classes of Fellows in the College; Active, Masters, Honorary, and Life. Membership in the College shall be by invitation only and such invitation shall emanate from the Section or Region in which the Person to be invited lives or practices. Such a candidate, when elected, shall be a member of both the College and the Section or Region which proposed him.

Section 1. Fellows shall at the time of their induction be dentists in active practice and in good standing in their respective countries.



Section 2. Masters shall, at the time of their induction, be active Fellows or Life Members who have rendered conspicuous and outstanding service to the College.

Section 3. Honorary Fellows shall be those who have rendered conspicuous and outstanding service to dentistry or closely related fields in the art and science of dentistry.

Section 4. Life Members

Upon retirement from active practice Fellows may at the discretion of the Board of Regents of the appropriate Section be made Life members. It is incumbent upon Life Members who have returned to active practice to apply for restoration of active membership. Life Membership may also be approved for Fellows of long standing who have reached a prescribed age in accordance with regulations approved by and at the discretion of the individual Section.

Section 5. A Section may after due deliberation and by action of its Board of Regents or its Governing Body establish another class of Membership. Such a class of Membership shall not be in conflict with the provisions of this Constitution. This action shall be reported to the Secretary-General of the College.

Section 6.

- a. The Fellows of a Section acquire no property, or parts thereof, belonging to the Section.
- b. Fellows in the College are allowed to use the letters F.I.C.D. (Fellow of the International College of Dentists) immediately following their name and professional degrees depending on the customs, laws, regulations and professional ethics of their respective Sections and locality.

Strengthening state units a major goal in his report

It has been a wonderful experience to serve as your President. The royal hospitality extended to me was beyond any expectations. I was amazed with the extensive planning and organization of the great major meetings in New York, Boston, Chicago and Atlanta. The warmth and kindness extended to all visit sites will never be forgotten. The College is alive and well at all levels.

The successful Leadership Conference in Nashville was dedicated to the Deputy Regents. The USA Section, in all its magnitude, is sustained and dependent on the vitality of the individual state unit. It has been my great pleasure to have served the last 21 years as an officer at various levels of the College. I would like to offer some suggestions to strengthen ICD activity at the state level, based on this involvement. I must first qualify these suggestions to note that many state units exceed these recommendations:

(1) Each state unit must have an annual meeting. If a joint meeting is necessary, it is essential that a separate

ICD business meeting be held before or after the joint luncheon or dinner. This allows ICD business to be conducted in a private setting and gives the Deputy Regent his chance for expression.

- (2) I would like to encourage each state unit to have a special social meeting. This could be a golf outing, a big game dinner, a baseball game or a formal gourmet dinner. For the last 31 years, in Missouri, we have had a terrific 3 day Bass Tournament as an annual event. This is a wonderful way to bring out true fellowship.
- (3) It is important to give the state Editor of ICD an active and important role. Each member can be offered a form to submit news to the State Editor. I noticed on my visitation to New York that they have such a special form available to all members. Photos are most important and add a great deal to ICD publications. We can be very proud of our new College Editor, Robert L. Smith and his effective communication offered to the membership by the <u>Key</u>.

(4) Each state unit should set up a formal Mentor Program as suggested by ADA President Eugene Truono and supported by ADA President-Elect Geraldine Morrow. Your USA Section has formally endorsed this program. This will not only help the transition of the young dentist into the profession, but remember these young people may someday be the strength of our College. This program is similar to the standing ICD project called ACT.

A major goal for this year is to help make each state unit stronger and more effective. That was the purpose of the Leadership Conference. These state units are all coordinated by our Central Office. I can never address the membership without expressing warm appreciation to our Registrar Richard G. Shaffer. His dedication is beyond description. Thanks to Richard and Florence. And thanks to the entire membership for allowing me to serve.

Dr. W. Neal Newton - a proven leader

Dr. W. Neal Newton was elected President of the International College of Dentists, U.S.A. Section, at the annual meeting of the College in Boston on October 11, 1990.

Dr. Newton has served as president of twelve dental organizations, including the Missouri Dental Association at the age of 39. He was a member of the House of Delegates of the American Dental Association for ten years and served on the A.D.A. Council of Federal Dental Services for six years.

He is a Fellow of the American College of Dentists and the American Academy of Pediatric Dentistry. As a member of Omicron Kappa Upsilon he was honored as "Alumnus of the Year" in 1972 by Washington University, School of Dental Medicine as "Distinguished Alumnus" in 1983. His fraternal affiliations are Sigma Alpha Epsilon and Delta Sigma Delta. He was Centennial Chairman for the Missouri Dental Association in 1965 and Centennial Chairman for the Washington University School of Dental Medicine in 1966.

He served a six year term on the St. Louis County Health Commission and was appointed by HEW Secretary, Elliot Richardson to a six year term on the Indian Health Advisory Board of the U.S. Government.


Dr. Newton received his predental education at the University of Illinois. After graduation from Washington University in 1951 he joined the faculty's Department of Dental Pediatrics. He served as Assistant Professor on the faculty for 18 years and also

served on the staff of the Medical School, Childrens Hospital and St. Louis County Hospital.

He was an Army dental officer during the Korean War (now a retired Lt. Colonel, USAR) and, after service, returned to an office in suburban Webster Groves, Missouri, limiting his practice to pediatric dentistry.

Dr. Newton and wife Nancy are parents of two sons: Gregory, a 1981 honors graduate of the Washington University, School of Dental Medicine; and Scott, a registered nurse in Pampano Beach, Florida. Nancy Newton, a registered nurse, works full time as a Nursing Supervisor at a convalescent home in Webster Groves.

Our ICD president makes things happen

Harold S. Eberhardt is a man of action – always toward contributing to and improving an organization. He is a truly dedicated, hard working leader. He is a genuine gentleman of intelligence who epitomizes the true professional with traits of fairness, honesty and integrity who has won the total respect and trust of his peers, contemporaries, friends and foes. This is the man who is President of the International College of Dentists.

Hal, as he is called most of the time, has been an active participant in outside activities since his very early college days. He very probably would have been so in high school but he worked at a bookstore on the University of Minnesota campus, opening it at 7:00 a.m. and working again after

school hours — all for the munificent sum of 11¢ an hour. Of course that was in 1924-25.

At the University of Minnesota he first entered Mechanical Engineering and then transferred to the Dental School. During those college years he met his wife-to-be, Tonie, who also was very active in extra-curricular affairs. Hal graduated from the School of Dentistry in 1931 and started his dental practice in downtown Minneapolis. Tonie and Hal were married in 1935 and are still going strong after 56 years. While Hal was busy with many dental organization activities Tonie was editor of her national sorority magazine for nine years, then was International President as well as working with the National Panhellenic Conference.

Hal, in the meantime, was building his practice and serving on most of the district dental committees and was elected President of the Minneapolis District Dental Society in 1952. He became active in the Minnesota State Dental Association and was elected President in 1961.

During these years Tonie and Hal were raising their family of three children, two sons and a daughter and naturally Hal was involved with the Boy Scouts and YMCA. He was Cub Master for four years and then Institutional Representative for two. He also

worked with the school PTA, as did Tonie.

In 1964 Hal was elected to the Board of Trustees of the American Dental Association, representing the 10th District after having served as delegate to both Minnesota and ADA House of Delegates for several years. He chaired several reference committees in each of these bodies. As ADA Trustee he won the respect and admiration of all Trustees. He not only knew the issues, but was very forthright in expressing his opinions and a strong adversary in any disagreement. After serving as ADA Trustee for six years he was elected Treasurer of the ADA in 1971 for a term of three years.

Several of his close friends have revealed that about this time he was urged to placed his name in nomination for President Elect of the ADA. A gentleman of integrity that he is, he declined the opportunity to lead the ADA because he had already pledged his support to a good friend that had announced his candidacy and he refused to renounce that pledge and campaign against a friend. American dentistry missed having a good and fearless leader.

In 1968 he was a delegate from the ADA to the first Federation Dentaire Internationale meeting to be held behind the Iron Curtain in Varna,

Bulgaria, on the Black Sea.

While working in the ADA, Hal also became active in the International College of Dentists, being inducted as a Fellow in 1953 when Elmer Best was Registrar. He was Deputy Registrar under Registrar Harold Westerdahl from 1959 through 1972. He was also named Editor of the College publications in 1959 and served in that capacity until 1976 — seventeen years. While he was Editor, the Letterette (now called the Key) was first published for the USA Section. He may be one of the last persons to have known all the Registrars and Presidents of the College.

He was elected President of the USA Section of the College in 1977. Since then he has been a member of the International Council of the College, where he has served as a member and Chairman of the Constitution and Bylaws Committee for several years. To many friends and leaders in the College he is known as "Mr. Constitution and Bylaws." He was elected and installed as President of the International College of Dentists in Singapore in 1990.

During these many years of continuous participation in dental activities Hal has been involved with other organizations as well as conducting a busy dental practice. He is a member

and Past President of the Minnesota Academy of Restorative Dentistry, a member of the American College of Dentists, Pierre Fauchard Academy and the Federation Dentaire Internationale. He belongs to Psi Omega dental fraternity and Tau Kappa Epsilon academic fraternity, and is an Honorary member of the Iowa Dental Association and the Nebraska Dental Association. Hal and Tonie have both belonged to the University of Minnesota Alumni Association continuously since graduation and both have been recognized by the University. Tonie was given the Alumni Association Service Award in 1955 and Hal received the Outstanding Achievement Award from the University of Minnesota in 1977, the highest award the University confers upon a former student other than an Honorary Degree. Hal has also been Guest of Honor of both his District and State Dental Societies and was awarded a Certificate of Appreciation by the International College of Dentists in 1973. He was elected Master of the College by the USA Section in 1975.

Along with all of his dental activities Hal enjoys summer vacations at their island cabin on Rainy Lake. The Eberhardts are the only inhabitants on their small island just north of Minnesota in the Canadian waters. Their 20-foot cruiser carries them to and from

the mainland and they also have a small fishing boat with outboard motor. The whole family – children, spouses, and grandchildren, all enjoy island life and the beauty and grandeur of this part of the world. One can work, fish, sit, pick blueberries, or take the cruiser for a picnic 25 miles up the lake.

If you ask this man, he is the luckiest guy in the world and the Lord has been good to him. He has a great wife, three fine children, two lovely daughters-in-law and five grandchildren (two boys and three girls) — and it is a happy family. What more can a man ask? Of course, the fact that Hal is himself a man of integrity and honor, with an abiding affection for his profession has something to do with his state of mind. His dedication to dentistry has been one of the strongest forces in his life and this year he continues to serve the International College of Dentists as its President.

A profile statement of Dr. Harold S. Eberhardt's character is best captured by Will Rogers who once said: "Everyone has good cause to be modest about something. No matter who you are, no matter what you do, there is something in the range of your experience that you do better, grasp more completely and understand more fully than those around you."

Dentistry and the International College of Dentists are better because of leaders like Harold Eberhardt.



Our Foundation scores with significant video

Dr. Jeanne Sinkford videotape presented to research center

On June 21, 1991 a videotape interview of Dr. Jeanne Sinkford, Dean of Howard University Dental School, was presented to the Moorland-Spingarn Research Center of Howard University to be added to the largest and most comprehensive repositories of information on the history and culture of people of African descent in the world. Dr. Jeanne Sinkford, the first and only woman dental dean, was interviewed as part of an ongoing ICD project "Chronicles of Outstanding Leaders in Dentistry" which has captured on videotape representatives of the academic, research, and professional community who have made a significant contribution to the profession. The ICD selected Dr. Sinkford to be among those to be interviewed because of her local and national prominence as spokeswoman on issues such as geriatric research, the needs of minorities in dental education, and the importance of programs to ensure access to quality dental care. The ceremony honoring Dr. Sinkford was sponsored by the American Association of Women Dentists, Howard University Chapter. Dr. Richard Adelson, Chair of ICD Video History Commit-

tee presented the tape in behalf of the College to Dr. Thomas C. Battle, Director of the Moorland-Spingarn Research Center.

The project undertaken by the ICD Video History committee has over the last six years set as its goal the preservation of the thoughts of dentistry's modern day leaders. As of this date 24 interviews have been completed, capturing the personal and professional history of leaders such as Harold Hillenbrand, representatives of the academic community including Maynard Hine, Clifton Dummett, and Alvin Morris; prominent clinicianteachers such as Miles Markely, Wilmer Eames, and L.D. Panky. From among the scientific community, the ICD has interviewed Ralph Phillips and Nelson Rupp.

The videotapes serve two valuable purposes consistent with the College's commitment to "conspicuous and meritorious service to the profession of dentistry". One, is to enable the College to influence the profession by offering dental students and professionals insight into the profession's history. Through contacts with these

role models, the viewer may be inspired to emulate these leaders toward greater achievement in their own personal and professional lives, to discover untapped sources of energy, and to find ways that they might also contribute to their profession and community.

Second, the ICD through these videotapes will respond to what is indeed a challenge to dentistry — to support the preservation of an important part of the profession's heritage before it is lost. Formal collections in museums, libraries and dental schools hold the writings, pictures, effects, of these important people. Most of the time, however, these collections are unable to give the depth and richness to the history of these people. Indeed, with out electronic technology we will preserve the faces and feelings as well as the voices of these dental greats.

This annual meeting honored ten new candidates for fellowship. Each sponsor introduced his candidate to



The international dental community lost a renowned scientist, teacher, and lecturer with the death of Dr. Ralph W. Phillips on May 17, 1991. Dr. Phillips, who was for decades one of the world's foremost authorities in the field of dental materials science, held the distinguished rank of Research Professor Emeritus of Dental Materials at Indiana University School of Dentistry. He died in Indianapolis at the age of 73.

Dr. Phillips was widely recognized as one of the most dynamic and sought after lecturers in dentistry; he appeared on more than 1,000 programs in the United States and elsewhere around the world. He organized and chaired more than 40 symposiums and conferences related to biomaterials and dental research.

As a pioneer in research Dr. Phillips was one of the first to investigate the relationship between laboratory tests and clinical performance. He initiated clinical investigations designed to evaluate the effect of the oral environment upon restorative materials and to determine the efficiacy of new formulations and techniques of usage. Over the years Dr. Phillips remained faithful to his original philosophy of focusing upon the clinical applications of laboratory findings—an approach that dominated both his teaching style and research activities.

Dr. Phillips was also at the forefront in recognizing that the first consideration for clinical success of a material lies not with its physical properties but with its compatibility— assuring safety to the dentist in handling and safety to the patient in terms of pulp and tissue response and systemic effects.

Boston convocation had induction, awards and entertainment.



You and dentistry benefit from foundation projects

The USA Foundation grows and flourishes through the steady support of the USA Section Fellows. The Foundation, based on solid principles, seeks to put into action the purposes and goals set forth in 1985. Your contributions help these to be achieved.

The ICD, USA Section Foundation, Inc. grew out of a sincere desire of the officers and Board of Regents to establish a separate non-profit, philanthropic entity dedicated to educational, scientific and charitable purposes within the profession of dentistry.

To accomplish this desire, at the 1984 meeting of the Section a committee was appointed to draft the proposed foundation. This draft of the Foundation's Constitution and Bylaws was presented to the Board of Regents at the annual meeting in 1985. Those active on this committee were Tom Emmering, Lloyd Phillips, Don Allen and George Selfridge. The committee received encouragement and valuable input from Registrar Frank Kenward, Herb Yee and the Officers and Regents. With the sanction of the Board of Regents, the Constitution and Bylaws were refined, completed and filed as a non-profit corporation. In January 1986 the USA Section Foundation was incorporated in Florida.

The purpose of the ICD, USA Section Foundation, Inc. as stated in the Constitution is:

- a) To encourage, aid and assist worthy projects and scientific dental research;
- b) To encourage, aid and assist graduate dentists in their continuing education and the improvement of their scientific knowledge and skills in the profession of dentistry;
- c) To encourage and assist dental students, graduate and post-doctoral dental students and pre-dental students;
- d) To encourage and assist in the establishment and maintenance of professional libraries for the use of such dental students, graduate and post-doctoral dental students, pre-dental students and graduate dentists;

To abide by the Florida law requiring an in-state registered agent residing in the state, Frank Kenward was designated the first registered agent of the Foundation. The first officers were Tom Emmering, president; Lloyd Phillips, vice-president; and "Satch" Selfridge, secretary-treasurer.

With a grant from the USA Section a brochure was produced and distributed to the ICD Fellows. The first official contribution was from District 8 and the first individual to make a contribution was Lon Carroll. Very quickly other individual and District contributions poured in. The pattern continues today. The USA Section contributes to the Foundation as memorials to deceased members. Today, voluntary contributions made along with our annual dues averages well over 70% of our members. Our Foundation growth has been accomplished without major solicitations, fund raising campaigns or the seeking of large gifts and pledges. Our Foundation has grown and flourished through this steady support.

One primary project of the Foundation is the College's Continuing Education Program. Many Fellows have enjoyed the finest in Continuing Education through this program.

Another worthy project, through a grant from the USA Section, provides major support for the Careers in Dentistry programs for dental students conducted by the American Association of Dental Schools. Future projects will adhere to the principle that will offer direct benefits to participating USA Section Fellows and those involved in the dental profession at all levels.
